# High Tech Gays to Aid in Passage of Sexual Orientation Legislation

As of this writing, the bill to amend the Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA) to include sexual orientation, or referred to officially as AB 101, has passed the committee of origination. AB 101 would prohibit discrimination against gays and lesbians in California in both employment and housing.

Despite protests by a large contingent of the religious right, AB 101 was passed by the Labor and Employment Committee by a 6-2 vote and will move on to the Ways and Means Committee for analysis of the fiscal impact should it pass. The bill will then return to the Assembly for debate and voting and then to the Senate for the same. If passed by both Houses, AB 101 will head for the governor's desk for his signature. Wilson has indicated that he will sign the bill, something his predecessor refused to do on several

occasions when similar legislation crossed his desk.

This is a very positive beginning but there is much work to be done before it becomes law and likely even more afterward. The "Bible Nazi's" are already preparing a public referendum to have AB 101 repealed should it pass. To help ensure the passage of the bill through the California Legislature and gear up for a campaign if an initiative is proposed, various coalitions are being formed to work on this project.

As president of High Tech Gays, I intend to involve this organization in the efforts to achieve passage of AB 101 and to fend off a ballot initiative. I will ensure that up to date information is printed in the newsletter and made available at the meetings, I will appeal for assistance when needs arise and I will enlist the talents of the Political and Business Action Committee (PABAC) of HTG. We have tremen-

dous resources that must by used to achieve this goal.

The steering committee, of which I am a member, formed by the Bay Area Municipal Elections Committee (BAYMEC) to coordinate community activities surrounding AB 101 has scheduled a meeting for April 11th. The committee will discuss the organization of community wide meetings and building a broad based coalition. Please contact me if you would like to attend.

There is a great deal of work to be done but the most important thing to do right now is contact your state and local legislator and encourage s/he to support AB 101. And tell your friends and family to do the same. Strong support by both houses of the legislature may make it more difficult for the

# Gay Community Representatives Meet With San Jose Mercury News

Representatives of the gay and lesbian community in the South Bay recently met with three members of the staff of the San Jose Mercury News to discuss the paper's coverage of the community. The meeting, organized by Greg Hullender of the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) and a member of HTG, was arranged as an effort to bolster the understanding between the gay community and the major newspaper in the Silicon Valley.

Deputy managing editor Tom Kunkel, columnist Joanne Jacobs and news editor Charlie McCallum spent over an hour with the contingent made of members of BAYMEC, GLAAD/South Bay and Santa Cruz, the Billy DeFrank Center, ACT-UP/South Bay, the ARIS Project and HTG. The group praised the Merc for improved coverage of gay and lesbian issues but felt there was still room for change. Criticism was directed at the lack of the coverage of gay and lesbian events, the 'straightening out' of letters to the editor which have a gay bent and the lack of representation during holiday periods such as Valentine's Day. More important criticisms addressed the lack of coverage portraying a gay and lesbian lifestyle in a positive way and failing to offer an opposing view when a spokesperson is quoted expressing a negative opinion of gays and lesbians.

Reinforcing the invisibility of the community by failing to mention a person's sexual orientation in an article when that information has relevance was cited as another complaint. The group pointed out that often times a straight person's familial status is mentioned in an article when that information has little bearing on the subject of the article. They questioned the Merc's selective editing when an article is written about a gay person.

As advice to the community, Kunkel and Jacobs pointed out that writing letters to editor is the best way to get an opinion expressed in print, noting that the letters and the editorials are the most read items in the newspaper. In the area of communication between the community and the Merc, McCallum promised a liaison from the paper would make contacts.

The general feeling of both parties was that a lot had been accomplished and the time was well spent. All agreed to keep lines of communication open and to work together for the benefit of all.


